Program Notes

Balmages, Dragonfly

You'll believe we have dragonflies buzzing around our gymnasium when we perform this imaginative piece for our beginning band program. Dragonfly was written to feature the brass section melodically buzzing their mouthpieces along with the woodwind and percussion parts.

Compello, Inception

Inception is an original concert overture for the youngest of bands. It uses only the first six notes of the Bb-major scale. Simple eighth-note rhythms are found only in the snare drum and tambourine parts. It should be played in a boldly aggressive *marcato* style at a brisk tempo.

Edmondson, Screaming Eagles (Concert March)

The Screaming Eagles Concert March is dedicated to the 101st Airborne Division which was formed during World War II. They landed at Normandy, fought in Holland, Belgium (the Battle of the Bulge) and closed out the war by taking over Hitler's Bavarian hideaway. Reactivated for the Korean War, they have served with distinction ever since, including the Vietnam conflict. After the Korean War, the 101st Airborne was assigned to Fort Jackson, South Carolina, as a basic training unit in Infantry.

Balmages, Kyiv, 2022

Notes from the composer:

"Like so many around the world, I believe strongly in the ability of one person to make a difference for those in Ukraine. To that end, after 16 years, I have decided that it is now time for an official 'sequel' to one of my most popular pieces for young band - *Moscow*, 1941. This work was composed in the first weeks of the Russian invasion into Ukraine, during which the entire world has seen senseless tragedy, humanitarian crises, and incredible heroism and passion from the



Ukrainian people. This piece, *Kyiv, 2022*, changes the narrative, where the theme from Moscow, 1941 (which is based on the Russian folk song '*Meadowlands*') now becomes the aggressor, and the heroic people of Ukraine are represented by the *Ukrainian National Anthem* and the powerful song '*Prayer for Ukraine*'". - March 24, 2022

Program Notes

Grainger/De Stefano, Shepherd's Hey

Percy Grainger (1882-1961) was a piano prodigy turned composer who was known for his strange personal habits, his colorful prose, and his equally unusual music – his many admirers today still recognize that he possessed "the supreme virtue of never being dull." Born in Australia, he began studying piano at an early age. He came to the U. S. at the outbreak of World War I and enlisted as an Army bandsman, becoming an American citizen in 1918. Grainger made several different settings of Shepherd's Hey, which is based on a folk tune collected by the British folk song expert Cecil Sharp. The band version came in 1918. This coincides with the end of Grainger's stint in the US military, which appears to have been instrumental in sparking his interest in band music. The tune itself is a Morris dance, a centuries-old tradition of fluid, group dancing from England.

Balmages, Midnight Sky

Midnight Sky is a beautiful moment of musical solitude in which listeners close their eyes and imagine a quiet moment under the stars, uninterrupted by the hustle and bustle of everyday life. We often forget to embrace those moments of peace and tranquility. This work seeks to bring that calmness back into our lives.

Owens, Stormchasing

While the hobby of tracking severe weather can be a riveting adventure, it is also filled with great peril. Tornadoes pose a particularly dangerous pursuit as they are quite violent and often occur with little warning. Taking root in the 1950's, sophisticated storm chasing is today widely popular among those intrigued with the extreme forces of nature. Exuding both mystery and power, *Stormchasing* offers us a musical glimpse of a most unusual quest. Beginning slowly, drops of rain can actually be heard underneath whispering woodwinds and an ominous low voice melody. The theme gradually builds and the chase is on by way of a strong melodic trumpet statement. Becoming briefly and eerily calm, the music slowly brings us into the heart of the chase before driving to the sudden and abrupt conclusion.

Program Notes

Akey, Fire Dance

In the spirit of 20th century neo-classical music, **Fire Dance** captivates the audience with a frenzy of rhythm and an intense melody. This piece is a great educational tool for young musicians. It begins with a fairly simple, repetitive melody that every instrument plays at one point or another. Within a certain phrase, the time signature may change as many as five times. Fire Dance is reminiscent of Igor Stravinsky's ballet "Firebird", which was later animated in Disney's "Fantasia 2000". We hope you enjoy Douglas Akey's **Fire Dance**!

Holst/arr. Story, Second Suite in F for Military Band

The Second Suite consists of four movements, all based on specific English folk songs. **Movement II: Song Without Words, 'I'll Love My Love'**. Holst places the fourth folk song, I'll Love My Love, in stark contrast to the first movement. The movement begins with a chord from French horns and moves into a solo of clarinet with oboe over a flowing accompaniment in F Dorian. The solo is then repeated by the trumpet, forming an arc of intensity. The climax of the piece is a fermata in measure 32, followed by a trumpet pickup into the final measures of the piece.

Movement IV: Fantasia on the Dargason. This movement is not based on any folk songs, but rather has two tunes from Playford's Dancing Master of 1651. The finale of the suite opens with a melody based on the folk tune Dargason, a 16th century English dance tune included in the first edition of The Dancing Master. The fantasia continues through several variations encompassing the full capabilities of the band. The final folk tune, Greensleeves, is cleverly woven into the fantasia by the use of hemiolas, with Dargason being in 6/8 and Greensleeves being in 3/4. At the climax of the movement, the two competing themes are placed in competing sections.






2014 ASAE Power of A Silver


